We also **invest** in our community's future by empowering the next generation through Jewish Student Connection clubs in public high schools and the transformative Joyce Zeff Israel Study Tour, and by making grants to strengthen both local Jewish organizations and our partners in Israel. These efforts help ensure a vibrant, resilient Jewish future rooted in learning, leadership, and shared responsibility.

More than ever, we are committed to **protecting** the Jewish people. We provide security training, support access to nonprofit security grants, and partner with the Secure Community Network to monitor

and respond to threats—ensuring our community remains safe and prepared. Protection also means advocacy. Through our Jewish Community Relations Council, we combat antisemitism in government, champion policies like the nonprofit security grant program, and build strong relationships with legislators on both sides of the aisle. JEWISHcolorado thanks the many donors whose truly extraordinary support raised **\$9,228,162** for our Annual Campaign, exceeding our fundraising goal for Fiscal Year 2025 by approximately **\$770,000**.

More than **2,000** donors made more than **3,300** gifts. Yes, you read those numbers correctly. An impressive **64 percent** of donors made multiple gifts in FY'25. The total amount raised this year surpasses last year's Annual Campaign fundraising by **nearly 17 percent**.

This level of support means that JEWISHcolorado can continue to offer programs, events, and initiatives that strengthen a vibrant Jewish community across the state. But what differentiates Jco is that our vision extends beyond the state and the country to the needs of the global Jewish community.

In Fiscal Years '24 and '25,
JEWISHcolorado raised more than \$13
million in Emergency Funds, the majority
of which went to support Israel in the wake
of the Hamas terrorist attack. Working



with our global partners and partnership regions in Israel, JEWISHcolorado ensured that your donations had genuine impact on real people whose lives have been forever changed by October 7th.

With your ongoing generosity in the coming months and years, JEWISHcolorado will continue to fulfill a five-fold role in the community:



From Darkness to Light

esponding to an invitation from
JEWISHcolorado, 2,000 people arrived at
Temple Emanuel on the evening of October 7,
2024, carrying the somber weight of a year of
death, disruption, war, and grief.

Ninety minutes later, those same 2,000 people left Temple Emanuel with renewed hope that after the darkness of 365 days, there can also be a future with light.

Fulfilling its mission to convene the community in times of celebration and in times of mourning, JEWISHcolorado, in partnership with 40 community organizations, brought people together to pay tribute to those who died in moments of terror, those who have died and been wounded in the service of Israel, and those hostages who are still held captive.

"For 76 years, we have bent the arc of Jewish history, not merely toward survival but toward a future where the Jewish state could thrive—a beacon of resilience and hope," said JEWISHcolorado Board Chair Ben Lusher. "October 7th tore through that hope, reminding us that the scars of our past are not so easily healed, reminding us that the trauma of generations still beats within us, and reminding us that we are part of the Jewish people's ancient struggle for peace, security, and dignity."

t might have been the camaraderie of more than 200 women and men gathered at The Cable Center on September 24 for lunch and laughter.


It might have been the words of Iris Kraemer, Chair of National Women's Philanthropy for Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA).


It most certainly was the generosity of the family of Ruth Malman who was honored with the 2025 Kipnis-Wilson/Friedland Award.

Celebrate Israel

n May 4, 2025, JEWISHcolorado's annual Celebrate Israel Walk & Festival revived one of its favorite traditions—the "Walk." More than 2,000 Jewish people and their allies from across the state and around the world gathered at Denver's Great Lawn Park to celebrate and march, honoring the state of Israel—its culture and people.

Connectors Program

n a Monday evening in November, Dina Silverman's home was packed with guests, all of whom had three things in common—they wanted to connect with their local Jewish community, they filled out a questionnaire on the JEWISHcolorado website, and they heard back from someone in JEWISHcolorado's Connectors Program.

The need for a Connectors Program had long been the topic of conversation at JEWISHcolorado's Women's Philanthropy Committee. October 7th prompted Silverman to "raise my hand" and get the program off the ground.

Working with Silverman, JEWISHcolorado's digital team added a short questionnaire on the Jco homepage for people who were either new to the area or new to JEWISHcolorado.

At the same time, Silverman recruited a cohort of Connectors—people who are very plugged into the local Jewish community and are willing to help newcomers get oriented.

Silverman describes her role in the Connectors Program as "100% matchmaker." She reviews the information people submit and tries to match with a connector who is "a good fit."

"People are so grateful," she says. "They meet one person, and that person introduces them to more people, and those people make more introductions. It just makes a world of difference."









PJ Library

ary Ann Weiss calls it "toddler mayhem."
Parents call it "the kind of event we want to come to."

And PJ Library Manager Bethany Friedlander says it is a "testimony to the power of a single person."

This "Pre-Hanukkah Shabbat Dinner" is all that and more as Weiss and other PJ Library Family Connectors have invited more than 100 moms, dads, grandparents, and children of all ages to what feels like a very large and joyfully noisy family reunion.

In the two years since Weiss signed up to be a Family Connector for Jewish families in her neighborhood, she has watched interest in the program grow significantly.

"Jewish life has adapted to meet families where they are," says Weiss. "That is the superpower of Judaism. It can evolve."

The PJ Library Family Connector program launched two-and-a-half years ago when JEWISHcolorado received a grant from the national PJ Library to fund three Connectors in Colorado. Today, JEWISHcolorado's PJ Library program has Family Connectors in communities around the state.

"We owe a tremendous debt to these Family Connectors," Friedlander says. "They are the eyes and ears and hearts of the Jewish community." \hdots

YAD in Israel

his year, eight young people involved in
JEWISHcolorado's Young Adult Division
(YAD) traveled to Israel as part of an
exchange program with young Israelis from
JEWISHcolorado's partner region, Ramat HaNegev.
The Israeli cohort had visited Colorado earlier in the
year. Two members of the YAD group shared thoughts
about the impact of the trip on their lives.

Lauren Hughes: "Going on the YAD trip reinforced my sense of my Jewish identity. When questions about Israel come up from coworkers or friends, I have greater confidence, and I also have a new perspective and understanding to share.

"This trip also means that I have a community of young Jewish people in Denver that I did not have before—and they are welcome to come to Steamboat, where I live! YAD is connecting Jews beyond the Front Range."

Alex Markovitch: "Until this trip, I didn't fully appreciate to what degree October 7th was still so immediate for people. They wanted to talk about that day and bear witness to people they loved and lost.

"This trip made me feel more connected to a global Jewish community. I met all these exceptional people who were helping to create this special refuge and homeland for Jews. Having friends in Ramat HaNegev has deepened my connection to Israel and helps me feel more invested in their future."

passion for Israel, JEWISHcolorado's
Shinshinim have become favorites at

immersed in Colorado's Jewish community, educating
youth about Israeli society and culture and building
bridges between Colorado and Israel.

Israel & Overseas Center

n any given day, you can find
JEWISHcolorado Shlicha Nelly Ben Tal
in the community, making presentations,
creating partnerships, troubleshooting
issues, and building relationships. During a crisis, Ben
Tal's connections in Israel are indispensable, but her
contributions behind the scenes often go unseen.


Every week, she meets with Noa Notrika, Manager of the Israel & Overseas Center (I&OC), the umbrella under which all JEWISHcolorado work related to Israel is managed. The two discuss I&OC projects, including education, events, travel, missions, programming, partnerships, the Shinshinim, and the partnership with Ramat HaNegev.

"Noa is a natural strategic planner," Ben Tal says. "She connects everyone at JEWISHcolorado who is working on projects related to Israel, and she keeps the community up to date through the I&OC newsletters."

Since October 7th, the I&OC is more vital than ever, evolving beyond connection and education to the cultivation of authentic relationships, diverse voices, and immersive experiences. It enables people in Colorado to have a meaningful impact in Israel and gives Israelis a deeper connection with Jewish life in Colorado.

"The Israel & Overseas Center is a hub for all things Israel, a place where all questions are welcome," Ben Tal says. "We are always building bridges between the JEWISHcolorado community and the people of Israel."









JSC Talks Antisemitism

t's lunchtime at DSST: Cedar High School and the menu for students at JEWISHcolorado's Jewish Student Connection (JSC) Club includes bagels, cream cheese, and a frank discussion of antisemitism.

For the past 10 years, Scott Esserman has been facilitating these discussions for students on behalf of the Anti-Defamation League (ADL). During November, JEWISHcolorado arranged for Esserman and other ADL facilitators to meet with Jewish Student Connection clubs in high schools around the metro area and in Boulder. The students—Jewish and non-Jewish—grapple with some of the most difficult definitions and actions demanded by a significant increase in global antisemitism.

"It is important to teach people what antisemitism is and what to do when you see it because for some people, the definition seems up in the air, and you don't know what to do," says Senior Sophie Moss, President of the DSST: Cedar Jewish Student Connection Club. "Having the ADL here is another way to combat antisemitism because they make it clear—it is not okay at all."

"Now more than ever, the partnership between JSC and the ADL is relevant and important," adds Jillian Feiger, Director of Teen and Israel Engagement. "JEWISHcolorado, in collaboration with the ADL, invests in the program to ensure that students have the tools and resources they need to respond to antisemitic incidents."

Joyce Zeff Israel Study Tour

enerations of Coloradans have traveled to Israel on the Joyce Zeff Israel Study Tour (IST), thanks to JEWISHcolorado's ongoing investment in the program. In 2025, 55 teens left Denver in early June with plans to spend the first week in Poland and then travel to Israel for an additional four weeks.

On June 13, two days before their departure for Israel, the group awoke to news that Israel had launched a series of strikes against Iranian military and nuclear facilities. Iran retaliated with strikes on Israel. Ben Gurion International Airport stopped all flights, and Secure Community Network (SCN) advised JEWISHcolorado that, in the interest of safety, the trip should return to the U.S.

Understandably, there was disappointment, but one participant, Risa Nutt, talked about how the experience of visiting concentration camps in Poland took on new meaning even though she was not able to travel to Israel.

"I do believe that everything happens for a reason," Nutt says. "I think I may have found more meaning from the experience in not going to Israel than if I did go. I learned this very important lesson. Israel was created to be a safe place for Jews. We couldn't go there because it wasn't safe. That will always be a reminder to me how much we need Israel to be our safe place."











Real Estate Adventures

EWISHcolorado's Real Estate & Construction Network (RECN) brings real estate professionals together to meet, network, and learn from the brightest minds in the business—all while investing in the future of Colorado. In late April, 17 members of RECN traveled to see some of the crown jewels of Chicago real estate development and meet with their real estate and construction counterparts.

"It was just terrific to meet the people who had done these projects because it is such a great connection for us," says RECN Chair Stuart Zall. "We could also spend two days and evenings with people from our community and get to know them on a deeper level."

In Chicago, RECN trip participants visited the headquarters of Secure Community Network (SCN), the organization that monitors threats to Jewish safety and security across North America and partners with JEWISHcolorado in the duties of three Regional Safety & Security Advisors.

"Protecting the Jewish community is a priority for SCN, but protecting the American way of life is their main goal," says Zall. "When JEWISHcolorado asks us to make donations, it feels good to know that our dollars are going to something that is, unfortunately, so important." \square

Iron Nation

n the days after October 7, 2023, Chen Linchevski had an idea that would reverberate from Israel throughout the world and ultimately lead to investments made through The Foundation at JEWISHcolorado. With Co-founders Gil Friedlander and Jason Wolf, Linchevski launched "Iron Nation."

"Israel is a country that boasts a robust start-up culture with a dynamic amount of innovation," says Ben Valore-Caplan, Co-President of Syntrinsic, JEWISHcolorado's investment advisor. "The original purpose of Iron Nation was to raise capital for an emergency fund to partner with some of Israel's most promising start-up companies working in technology, health care, agriculture, and cybersecurity."

Iron Nation set out to raise \$20 million to be able to provide investment capital—not philanthropic donations—to 15-20 promising companies to keep them afloat in the short term.

With the success of Iron Nation's Fund I in attracting and deploying capital for Israel's start-up ecosystem, it should be no surprise that Fund II has already been started, in part because of investments from organizations like JEWISHcolorado.

"This is not intended to be a concessionary investment, where some financial returns are sacrificed to achieve a social or environmental impact," says Valore-Caplan. "The goal here is to make a healthy return. Iron Nation creates an unusual opportunity to blend JEWISHcolorado's financial objectives and its mission in Israel." □









JCRC

his past year, JEWISHcolorado's
Jewish Community Relations Council
(JCRC) focused on three strategic
areas: advocacy, government relations,
and crisis management.

Under these focus areas, the JCRC:

- Launched the Mobilization Corps, training nearly 200 community members;
- Convened the Jewish Civic Network, creating a supportive network of Jewish professionals in civic-adjacent organizations;
- Organized a Jewish Caucus at the state capitol;
- Led the Public Officials Mission, bringing a bipartisan delegation of 11 state legislators to Israel for the first time since October 7th:
- Successfully advocated to maintain Nonprofit Security
 Grant Program funding in the Colorado state budget;
- Represented the Colorado Jewish community in Washington D.C., lobbying members of the Colorado congressional delegation;
- Placed op-eds in The Denver Post, Haaretz,
 The Colorado Sun, and USA Today.

In the year ahead, the JCRC will begin to bring this advocacy work beyond the Jewish community, building a coalition of partners who are committed to reinforcing civic norms and protecting against antisemitism and all forms of identity-based violence.

"The Colorado Jewish community needs a plan to build lasting safety," says JCRC Senior Director Brandon Rattiner. "Rising antisemitism is part of a wider swell in division and hate, and these threats are deeply interconnected."

Public Officials Mission Trip

n May, JEWISHcolorado's Jewish Community
Relations Council (JCRC) led its long-anticipated
Public Officials Mission to Israel. The JCRC brought
11 state legislators from both sides of the aisle
and more than 20 community leaders to Israel for a
nine-day tour of the country. Included in the group
were Rep. Anthony Hartsook, a Republican from
Parker and Rep. Meghan Lukens, a Democrat from
Steamboat Springs.

Rep. Hartsook: "I have always defended Israel, but my support of Israel has been reinforced by walking the land. It's important to consistently remind people that when you talk about Hamas, you are not talking about a political entity. You are talking about a terrorist organization that forces people into line by intimidation, brutalization, even death. We need to fight terrorist organizations—whether it's Hamas, the Taliban, Hezbollah, or Al-Qaeda—it doesn't matter who it is."

Rep. Lukens: "I have taught about the Holocaust and combatting hate and antisemitism in my classroom, and I thought about those themes on this trip. The reality is that there are terror organizations that want to eradicate Israel and annihilate the Jewish population. That is creating increased antisemitism around the world. We need to lead with compassion, kindness, respect, and dignity to solve problems. This trip has empowered me to talk about this issue with greater confidence, understanding, and credibility."









White Rose Awards

1942, Christian students at the University of Munich founded the White Rose movement to resist the Nazi regime. In the aftermath of the October 7th attack, the White Rose Society was formed to honor non-Jewish individuals whose public support of the Jewish community fosters unity among all people.

This year, JEWISHcolorado presented the White Rose Award to former Colorado State Senator Janet Buckner and Representative Leslie Herod for their actions after October 7, 2023, to cool tensions and counter misinformation at the Capitol and across the state and to Colorado Mesa University President John Marshall for his unwavering and outspoken support of Jewish students on campuses in the wake of October 7th.

JEWISHcolorado also presented the White Rose Award to Secure Community Network Regional Director Phil Niedringhaus, and Regional Security Advisors Kevin Farrington and Brian Maloney.

Through JEWISHcolorado's Regional Safety & Security Initiative, these three individuals have done critical and impactful work, enhancing the safety of more than 120 organizations across the state. They have helped institutions receive nonprofit security grants to improve the security of their buildings and trained more than 10,000 individuals in actions that will protect and save lives in an emergency.
